(a) Beneficiaries

Ranju aged 13 was studying in class II in Govt School when her father had a paralytic attack in 2008 and lost his job. The family consisting of 8 members (mother, father § 6 children) had no source income except for a meager amount of rent from a portion of their house perforce rented out. Besides the livelihood of whole family, marriage of the eldest daughter was also performed with this meager income. This resulted discontinuation of regular schooling of Ranju. Ms Sheetal a teacher from Rasta contacted her during mobilization and motivated her to join our learning center and appear for class V from National Institute of Open Schooling which she did. She



has completed class V and now studying in VIII standard. She said "Rasta helped me in need". Her dream is to become a teacher and RATA is committed to support her for realization of her dream.

Kalyaní aged 19 years joined STEP course for 6 months. Her father is a casual labourer and has a family of 5 members to support from his meager salary. Kalyaní took keen interest in the course. Rasta, staff realized her potential and gave extra attention to this girl to realize her dream for a job and willingness to support the family. She was recommended for customer care executive job in Net Ambit by placement officer of Smile Foundation and selected. Today she is working their with a monthly salary of Rs. 7000/pm and supporting her family. Say says "Rasta not only transformed me but improved the lot of my family too". This girls

Educational Activities.

Pre-School Education

Children in the age group of 3-6 were admitted to our pre-school classes. They were prepared for admission to Class I in formal school by adopting play way method of children participation. This category of children was enrolled in Khora colony, Indira Camp-I or II and Mandawali centers. Three Pre School Classes covered 86 children. At the end of academic year.....children were admitted to various formal schools.

Non Formal Education

Children in the age group of 614, who either missed schooling or dropped out of the school, were provided opportunity to have education at par with formal schooling through our Non Formal Education Centers.
They were prepared for taking admission in formal schools to



different classes from II to VIII and entrance to OBE programs for certification by NIOS. **301** children were taught from 1st to 10th in our Khora center, **25** children in Indira Camp I and Indira Camp II through Non Formal Education.

Remedial Education

Children attending formal classes up to standard VIII in government schools participated in the remedial education classes and were given extra in puts in the subjects they were lagging behind in their class by applying innovative TLM.

Children were enrolled in Indira Camp-I and Indira Camp-II centers. Total of 124 children in 5 classes were given remedial education during this year.

Vocational Education

An empowerment & employment program known as STeP (Smile Twin e-Learning Program) was under taken in partnership with Smile Foundation. Girls between the age group of 18 to 32, having cleared 12th standard and willing to work were enrolled for empowerment under this program. Following subjects were covered under this course:-

- a) Basics in Computer Application
- b) English Speaking
- c) Personality Development
- (d) Basics in Management
- (e)Retail Management

In the year 2010 to 2011, 120 girls got their name enrolled in this short term course and 38 girls got the job in different sectors like (Mall, Retail Shop, Bank, BPO, Education Department (as a Teacher), and Computer Operator).

Another program of cutting and tailoring was conducted in Rasta's Vocational Center at Khora. This program was for



house wives and other interested females. The duration of each course was ... months. Totalgirls was trained in this vocational center.

<u>Spoken English for Employability</u>. This was three months english speaking course for boys and girls in partnership with The Times of India Group. Two courses were conducted during the period of report.

Rasta is authorized study center by NIOS for OBE programs. Students studying in our NFE centers appear for levels A B& C examinations conducted by NIOS. **Three** students appeared for level (10th class) and all three passed. Thus our achievement was 100% result.

Through OBE 09 students appeared and 8 passed the exams

Community Health

* HIV AIDS Awareness Program



An awareness program on HIV AIDS was conducted at four locations (Ashok Nagar, Mandawali, Anand Vihar and Gazipur clusters) on 1st January 2011. In January to March we did Need Assessment. Total no. of population in these four locations was 60,000 and our target was only 10,000. The primary target group was Migrant Workers and secondary community. Out of 60,000 people, 25,000 were migrant workers in that area.

2/3 population was living with family or relatives and 1/3 was single. Against the target we registered 500 people for primary check up for HIV AIDS 1 cases was referred and tested.

Pulse- Polio

On pulse –polio Day, we arranged the camp and all the staff members took part in camp. Every year on

Pulse Polio Day at least 200 to 250 children take the benefit from these camps.

Health Programs

In communities we arranged Sanitation Drives or Health and Hygiene programs. Community leaders and Mothers groups took part in these awareness programs and gave guidance about health and hygiene to the community.

Community Organization

We organize community based groups, self help groups, Mothers groups, Youth groups and Pressure groups in various communities in our areas of operation i.e. Indira Camp I & II (Slums behind Hassanpur Depot) Khora colony (Ghaziabad).

Income Generation

Rasta visited RWAs in the nearby areas and collected old news papers from the residents of these colonies. These envelops were sold in the market and fetched some income to participants and to our organization.

Resources mobilization

During this year due to economical slow down we faced acute scarcity of funds for sustaining our ongoing projects. We undertook a vigorous resource mobilization program. We took up our case with our past, present partners and prospective partners and corporate and individual donors for support. We were able to sail through during this difficult phase and sustain our entire projects going.

IOC Limited was contacted for providing safe drinking water, alternate power supply for lighting in the class rooms and Desks and chairs for the students.

Research and Documentation

Rasta got another opportunity to evaluate implementation process and achievements in Street to School Programme for children in two Education and Activity Centres established one each at Nehru Place and Lajpat Nagar Delhi. The Nehru Place centre is a direct intervention by the Delhi State Office of Save the Children, India and the centre at Lajpat Nagar has been established in collaboration with an NGO partner- CHETNA.

The objective of the research study was to evaluate implementation process and achievements of the project specially its outcome, effectiveness and sustainability. The review comprised of both primary data collection as well as reviewing secondary literatures.

Rasta successfully completed the research study program at Delhi and Kolkata and submitted its report which was appreciated by Save the Children, India Organization.
