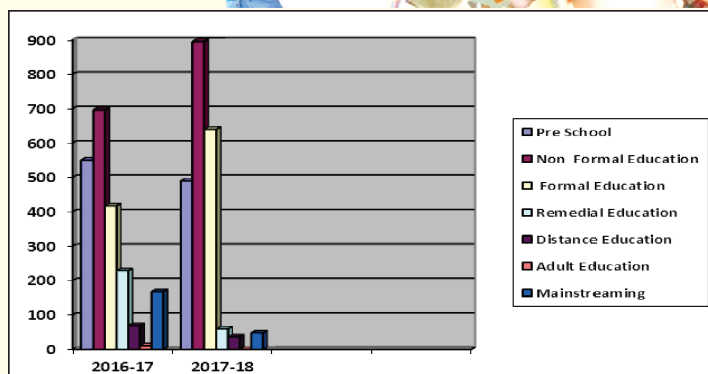

Education

Focus on and facilitating education of children in the age group of 3 to 18 years (particularly the girl child) has continued being the primary aim of Rasta. In 2017-18, nearly 19,925 children continued to get educated through interventions like Pre-school, Formal Education, Non-formal Education, Remedial Education, and Distance Education. Development of innovative teaching- learning aids was a continuous process to meet the changing requirement of teaching. Digitalization of education and introduction to computer learning is also an important component of education. Various co-curricular activities were conducted for holistic Development of children. Also events like Independence Day, Republic Day, Cultural events, National Girl Child Day were the major highlights of the Program.



Muskan ASPIRES TO BECOME A TEACHER SO THAT SHE CAN TEACH OTHERS

Eleven year old Muskan is 4th among the 7 siblings. Her father Shahid is a hawker and mother is a housewife. Shahid barely earns enough to fetch the family two square meals a day. They lived in a one room tenement with hardly any ventilation. During a community survey in 2014 Rasta mobilisers found Muskan playing by the roadside. Initial efforts to convince her mother to enroll Muskan at the Rasta school went in vain. Persistent efforts gave results, when Shahid agreed to admit Muskan to School.

Muskan joined 1st class in April 2014. She took to school like a fish to water. An alert and curious child, Muskan was quick to learn. Today she is in grade 4th at the Rasta school.

Rasta School, Khora

The 'Non Formal Education centre' which started with 40 girls now known as "RASTA SCHOOL, KHORA", educating 900 girls from Pre-School to Class VIII. The School has been recognized by the Govt. of Uttar Pradesh, vide their letter No.6993-95 dated 9/1/2015.



NO More Rag Picking

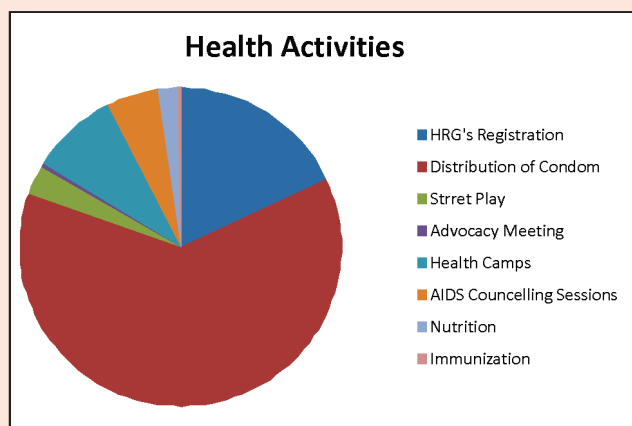
9 years old Gomti's family moved to Delhi, eight years ago in search of better livelihood. Her parents found employment at construction sites. She has four sisters and the family lives in Barola.

Gomti was identified during a community survey 2017. She was working as a rag picker. Rasta team met with her parents, who were happy to enroll their children to school, provided there were no fees. Her mother visited the centre to know more about the services. Initially she enrolled Gomti and her sister. However, Gomti took time to settle in the centre. She always wanted to go out. Gradually she was involved in various activities, coloring etc. Gomti is now attending classes regularly.



COMMUNITY HEALTH

Preventive, promotive and curative health care services continues being provided to the various communities. Several activities were conducted in the community to enhance their health awareness, like counseling, nutrition education, awareness on water and sanitation, on good food habits, health check-ups, immunization, HIV AIDS check-up & treatment, distribution of condoms etc. In health checkup camps, growth monitoring, vaccination and referral services are also provided. Rasta's linkages with different health institutions like Max Hospital, Sai Retina, Delhi Tuberculosis Association etc., enhance the effectiveness of these services.





Say No To AIDS

Mr. Prashant (Name changed) was tested HIV positive during community based testing in Kotla in December 2017. He was a government employee and migrated from Uttar Pradesh in the year 2015. He was living with his brother while his family stayed in village. When Prashant was tested positive he was quite reluctant and rude towards it. He was not ready to accept this fact. For two months Rasta team put their hard efforts to do his counseling and convinced him to do a test at a government hospital. Finally he did a test and found positive. Realizing this team immediately asked him to do the same test for his wife and children and as a result his wife also tested positive.

Without wasting the time the team quickly started with their medicine and proper follow up. Today both of them is taking proper medicines and the team is in continuous touch with him.

Vocational Training

Rasta promotes Skill development to youth and women from all age groups to promote livelihood. In 2017-18, total 120 women were trained under Tailoring and Beauty Culture. After successful completion of respective courses most of them were facilitated to get suitable employment or to start their own work.



WOMEN EMPOWERMENT

“There is no tool so effective for Development than the empowerment of Women”.

Rasta focuses on women empowerment through various social and economic interventions. Different activities are conducted in a year like facilitating of self-help groups, information dissemination, organizing income generating awareness programs and other. Rasta also helped them to establish their own work or business through facilitating loans from Self Help Groups. Rasta also focuses on celebrating events and programs with the ladies to keep them aware about the ongoing things and also to keep them motivated.

K.C. Pant, who founded Rasta School in Khora Colony, with his 10th students.

"Smile has played a big role in our success," says K.C. Pant, founder of Rasta Girls School in Khora Colony in Ghaziabad, UP. "They give us hand-holding support. They check the academic progress of the children they sponsor and monitor us closely. We have a common objective. They have the expertise to raise resources and our strength is our work in the field."

The Rasta School, abuzz with mostly Muslim girls, has become a landmark in Khora Colony, a poor neighbourhood of congested lanes. Pant, who founded the school in 2007, says 600 girls now study there.

It all began as a sort of challenge, he says. Vinod Khanna, a retired IPS officer and a consultant with Tech Mahindra, jokingly asked Pant if he could start a school for Muslim girls. Pant, who had worked 22 years for Deaplaya, said he just couldn't refuse.

Pant had to use all his persuasive skills to get parents to send their girls to school. "Here I was, a Hindu Pandit from Uttarakhnad trying to teach Muslim girls," he recalls. He and his field staff trudged to local *mosques*, *madrasas* and the neighbourhood. Finally, the community acquiesced and Pant began an informal pre-school and remedial classes for 250 girls. About 60 girls were helped to pass the National Institute of Open Schooling exam.

Rasta Girls School has now been recognised by the Uttar Pradesh State Education Board. The girls can appear for the CBSE exams too as private candidates. Meanwhile, Pant has opened two more Rasta schools.

Altogether Rasta provides education to 900 girls. The school has earned enormous goodwill within the community. The parents find the fees of ₹750 per month affordable.
