### ABOUT RASTA



We are a Non-Government Organization, functioning since 1994 for the empowerment of vulnerable sections of society in Delhi, Uttar Pradesh, Uttarakhand and Haryana, and enjoying national jurisdiction. Our main areas of intervention are Education, Community Health, Women Empowerment and Skill Development. So far, we have educated 28000 children, mainstreamed 8500 children and also developed need-based teaching-learning materials in Hindi, Maths and English for classes 3rd and 4th and imparted vocational skills to over 1200 youth, 40% of whom are in good jobs. Five research studies have been carried out for National and International organizations. We have imparted AIDS awareness to 1,50,000 migrants of high-risk behavior. Presently, Rasta is impacting the lives of 30,000 people directly and 2 lakhs indirectly with the help of 125 professionally trained staff, Wellwishers and our supporting partners.

### ORIGIN

Rasta" owes its origin to a group of socially conscious individuals, who were disturbed at the sight of children of school going age, rummaging in garbage heaps or standing at traffic intersections with begging bowls. They got together and deliberated upon the plight and potential of such children. The result was "Rasta", a non-governmental, not for profit organization, registered in 1994 under the Societies Registration Act XXI of 1860.

# PROGRAME OVERVIEW

### **FORMAL EDUCATION**

# RASTA SCHOOL, KHORA COLONY



Started in February 2007, as a Non-Formal Education center, with the exclusive aim of promoting education of girl children, 'Rasta School' is situated in Khora, Ghaziabad, on the border of Delhi and Uttar Pradesh, catering primarily to socially and economically backward people. The success motivated us to continue educating girls' even after the completion of the pilot project. Later, we faced the problem of certification in 2011. We approached NIOS for certification of classes 3rd, 5th and 8th. We further took the help of Open School for completion of class 10th and 12th for examination and certification. The Right to Education became fully functional in 2013. Consequently, we were not allowed to continue the non-formal education centre for long. Then we tried with the local government to seek recognition which took nearly 3 years. We received recognition up to class 8th from the Government of Uttar Pradesh. So far, RASTA SCHOOL has educated 4800 girls. We continue to focus on educating the poor marginalized girls with the support of like-minded partners.





# Major highlights of the project

- Following the country-wide lockdown announced by the Indian Government on 25th March 2020, Rasta School was closed. Yet Rasta teachers made all efforts to be in contact with the children and their families. Regular online classes were conducted in place of classroom teaching. The children were taught by way of Virtual Classes and given Classwork and homework via WhatsApp and/or phone calls.
- The Annual Academic Planner, both Class-wise and subject-wise, for the next session, was prepared by the teachers. Besides, multiple kinds of virtual activities were organised throughout the year even in lockdown situations to help the youngsters to get engrossed themselves in various activities and showcase their hidden talent. Some of the activities are mentioned below:-
- COVID AWARENESS CLASSES.
- The establishment of an English & Mathematics Lab with the support of SMILE Foundation with an aim to lessen the gap between contextual and rote based learning;
- Distribution of Dry Ration Kits to Rasta School children's families. Around 614 families received Dry Ration kits containing rice, wheat flour, pulses, soap, etc.
- Sanitary Care kits(Sanitary pads, Soap, Mask and Sanitizer)
  were distributed to senior students and their mothers and
  families to make them aware of self-safety and self-protection
  in the pandemic situation;
- Virtual celebration of important days and festivals.

# STORIES OF SUCCESS

"Thanks to RASTA, I now aspire to become an IAS officer and want to work for the upliftment of vulnerable children like me."

- Sama



Sama resides in Khora with her parents and 5 siblings. Her family migrated from rural Bihar to Delhi in search of better job opportunities. Sama's father works as a salesman but their monthly income is only Rs. 6,000. Sama and her sister wanted to go to school but could not due to the financial instability of the family, they couldn't.

When the RASTA Project team were visiting her neighborhood, and Sama heard about Rasta school and how children like her got an opportunity to study free of cost, she was ecstatic. Soon, a team of teachers from Rasta school visited her home and talked to her parents. Rasta's team made several visits, counselled her parents and convinced them to allow their daughter to attend the school.

Finally, after months of persuasion, her parents agreed to send Sama and her younger sister Seema to school.

Sama is a very intelligent and hardworking student. Earlier Sama used to hesitate in speaking in front of others, but now she expresses her views without any fear. She came first in the HINDI DAY competition by speaking her thoughts through a youTube video in which she scored many likes. Apart from that, she has won many academic awards as well. She is one of those students who plan and prepare her lessons beforehand. She's one of the favourite students of her teachers.

Now her parents feel proud of their daughter after seeing her progress.

"I have learnt so much from my teacher. They provided me insights into the world to which I want to belong. When I grow up, I would like to become an IAS Officer and want to work for the upliftment of vulnerable children like me" Saina – "I am happy that Gulafsa and I are in Rasta School, thanks to the Rasta teachers."



Saina belongs to an orthodox Muslim family, where girls are not allowed to study, but her passion and determination to study convinced her mother to support her. Saina's grandfather, Muhammed Jaleel Qureshi has a traditional outlook and was against sending girls to school. But Saina's mother insisted and sent all her four daughters and somehow managed to educate them till 8th standard, Md. Qureishi in his anger and ego married Saina's two elder sisters at a very young age. Saina was afraid that the same fate would flow to her. At Saina's request, two of her teachers from Rasta School approached Qureishi and convinced him about the importance of educating girls. And ultimately he agreed. Now Saina and her younger sister, Gulafsa, are studying in Rasta School, respectively in Classes 8 and 1st. Saina wants to become a police officer and serve the nation. She works very hard and is a very studious and intelligent girl. Her grandfather, who once used to be against girls' education, now himself wants his granddaughters to be successful and fulfil their dreams.

### NON FORMAL EDUCATION

### PROJECT UDAY, SUPPORTED BY HCL FOUNDATION

Migrant children from low-income families do not enjoy equal education opportunities like other children. This is due to three main factors: compulsions to move from place to place in search of work, non-availability of educational institutions near the worksites and financial inability to study in private educational institutions as these institutions charge high fees.

Project "Uday" serves the practical needs of migrant children through non-formal education and subsequently mainstreaming them. Rasta also inculcates the good practice of health & hygiene. It also draws attention to migrant children's development as human beings (giving them a sense of identity and social responsibility) and helps to nurture their social skills. Under project UDAY we have divided our classes into four major groups ie:

- Pre-School from 3-6 years
- Non-formal education from 6-14 years
- Remedial education for children mainstreamed in formal schools.
- There is yet another category of children, who, due to overage or otherwise, cannot study in formal schools.

# Major Highlights of the Project

- People in the project locations were motivated about the importance of educating their children and consequently, 1466 children were motivated and educated.
- 202 were mainstreamed in age-appropriate classes up to elementary level;
- 33 children were enrolled under Open Basic Education in NIOS;
- Children became healthy and active because of the nutritious, hot, cooked food served in Gurukul;
- Conducted remedial education classes for mainstreamed children and helped those children who could not be mainstreamed, to appear for Open Basic Examinations;
- Various awareness programmes conducted for the prevention of COVID 19;
- 1,70,000 packets of cooked meals and water distributed during COVID 19 pandemic;
- Dry ration kits and medical care kits were also distributed.





# SNAPSHOTS OF THE ACTIVITIES CARRIED OUT

The mainstreaming process was conducted from April to October 2020 (during the lockdown period the schools were closed due to Pandemic COVID -19) and the teachers followed up with Government schools for mainstreaming of children. We dialogued with Govt. school **Principals** regarding online of children. admission Teachers facilitated and helped children for appearing in tests and mainstreaming in schools. Total 202 students were mainstreamed in their age appropriate classes.





# **SUCCESS STORY**


"I am interested in playing cricket and want to be part of the Indian Cricket Team" -Junaid



Junaid, 13, moved from Bihar to Sarfabad with his family in 2016 to earn a living. Munna, his father, works in a small roadside tyre repair shop, and his mother works as a domestic helper. Junaid was forced to assist his father in the repair shop due to the family's financial situation. He had never attended school and now works to support the family. During a community visit Rasta Gurukul Teacher noticed Junaid working in a tyre repair shop, assisting his father with puncture repair work. While speaking with Munna, the teacher discovered that Junaid had never gone to school. She explained to his father about our Gurukul centre in Sarfabd and persuaded him to send Junaid to the learning centre. It was extremely difficult to persuade the family. Our teachers, on the other hand, never gave up and continued to motivate the family during visits to his shop and home. Junaid was enrolled in NFE class at Sarfabad 3 Gurukul Centre in November 2019 as a result of their efforts. He is very active and enjoys leading various events such as Bal Sabha. Junaid enjoyed the Gurukul centre so much that he persuaded his parents to send his two sisters, Gulnaaz and Farjana, to study there as well. In November 2020, Gulnaaz and Farjana were enrolled in NFE in Sarfabad 3. It was a very happy moment for the Gurukul Team when they saw one brother playing a role in the admission of his two younger sisters, who had never been to school before. Junaid and his sisters attended Gurukul Centre's Online classes on a regular basis during the COVID 19 pandemic.

### **COLLABORATION WITH MOBILE CRECHES**

For the last five years, Rasta has been running a Centre at Emerald Hills, Gurgaon. The centre has three subdivisions: a crèche for 0 to 3-year-old children, a Balwadi for 3-6 years, and a bridge course designed for 6-12 years.



Children above 6 yearswho were mainstreamed in formal schools also come to the centre for remedial education. The programme also focuses on making the community aware of the importance of early childhood care and development. This leads to a positive impact on the attitude and practises of the community towards young children. 74 children are benefited from this programme, as shown in the above graph.



# PROJECT NAYA SAVERA, INDIRA CAMP, NEW DELHI

Project Naya Savera is a joint venture of Rasta & IC Trust. It is based at Indira Camp (a JJ Cluster) in Hasanpur near Madhu Vihar, East Delhi. During the year , we have educated 121 children were eligible are mainstreamed in nearby Govt. schools. Alongside regular schooling, these children are given remedial classes. It has created a lasting impact in the community. The key objective of the project is to empower the community through education and the project is progressing towards achieving its goal.

# **Major Highlights of the Project**

- Online Classes using technologies like WhatsApp/videocalling/sharing worksheets and other learning materials.
- 25 children who gained eligibility for regular schooling were main streamed.
- PTM's were conducted to encourage parental support and increase student attendance for online classes. A total of 460 parents attended the meeting.
- Distribution of Ration and Care kit distributed among the families of the students.
- Polio camp was organised at the learning centre and 80 children benefited.



### GYASPUR LEARNING CENTER, SARAI KALE KHAN

Gyaspur Learning Centre started with the support of the Welspun Foundation in November 2020 with the aim to reach out to the children of migrant population.

Gyaspur colony was established during 1990s when a group of migrant labourers from Bihar and UP came to Delhi for their livelihood and constructed temporary huts in open areas which slowly turned into a big camp over a period of time. After conducting a baseline survey of 81 families in the community, we found that most of the kids in the age group of 10-14 years were not going to school or were dropouts, and had no knowledge of fundamentals of language or arithmetic and there was no awareness about basic health and hygiene. Further through this project, we aim to work on the following objectives:

- 1. Provide education to children of age group 3 to 6 through pre-school, and ensure enrolment of the children of 6-14 years in non-formal education centres and mainstream.
- 2. Provide life skills and counselling to adolescents on gender-based discrimination, self-defence and other skills;
- 3. Ensure improvements in health, hygiene and sanitation status, especially for women and young girls.

### **Major Highlights of the Project**

- Establishment of a Learning Centre 37 children in the age group of 3-6 years enrolled in preschool and 44 children in the age group of 7-14 years enrolled in Remedial and Non-Formal Education (NFE).
- Parent meetings and counselling sessions were organised in the community. Total 108 parents were reached out through such sessions.
- Sanitation drive and mask distribution activity was conducted where around 107 children and parents participated and were aware of Cleanliness and its benefits
- 153 beneficiaries were mobilised and reached out through community meetings.
- The training programme on Nutrition and Anaemia was organised with the objective of making students understand the difference between healthy and junk food.
- Training session on personal hygiene was conducted with Adolescent girls and boys.
- Self-defence lessons were imparted to the girls in the project
- OPD health camp was conducted in the learning centre. 90 beneficiaries were given free medical advice and medicines.
- Anaemia testing camp organised for children and women to check their haemoglobin levels
- Celebrations of important days and festivals where 173 students actively participated.

# **COMMUNITY HEALTH**

Community Health i.e. Preventive, Promotive and Curative is another important programmatic core area. Rasta visits the community and organizes health camps in which services like growth monitoring, testing for minor and major ailments, supply of vitamin tablets, supply of medicines for minor ailments and supply of nutritious food/special diet for small children, are rendered. Along with this, various activities are conducted in selected areas where services Like Immunization, Counselling, Nutrition education etc. are rendered.





### TARGETED INTERVENTION PROJECT


Targeted Intervention Project with the support of the National AIDS Organisation (NACO) Control and Delhi State Aid Control Society (DSACS) by implementing HIV/AIDS awareness programmes among migrant workers. The aim of the project is to educate people of HIV/AIDS respect conducting health camps, awareness camps, street plays in different the places under targeted intervention areas.





# **Major Highlights of the Project**

- Total no. of migrants registered (Cumulative) 18354
- Migrant Coverage through IPC session Coverage + Mid Media was around 78984
- The AIDS counselling session was attended by 8477 migrants.
- Around 300 health camps were organised for migrant workers and a total of 7124 migrants attended the Health Camp/Project Clinic



- 22 Migrants were Identified for STI in Health Camp/ Clinic.
- Around 15360 condoms were distributed to migrants and aware about HIV.
- 2463 HIV tests were done (ICTC + CBS)
- 3 Migrants were identified as HIV positive (ICTC + CBS) and all of them were further linked to ART(Antiretroviral Therapy)

### MAHILA PANCHAYAT PROGRAMME

Rasta runs the Mahila Panchayat programme in Mandawali area, Delhi is supported by Delhi Commission for Women (DCW). The objectives of this programme are: (a) Create mass awareness among women (b) make women legally empowered by making them aware of their legal rights and (c) address their issues. It also provides a forum for conflict resolution relating to family disputes at the community level. Along with this, it prepares women for legal action and seek legal aid when necessary.


These cases mainly pertain to bigamy, maintenance, domestic violence, alcoholism and other issues. Apart from this, service-related cases for securing Aadhar Card, Voter Identity Card, Birth Certificates etc. are also been addressed.

# **Major Highlights of the Project**

- During the year, general service facilities was provided to 221 people
- 490 cases were registered during the year and 618 cases were solved and closed.
- A total of 12 community meetings were conducted and through this meeting around 563 Women's were covered.
- 8 Mahila Panchayat meetings were conducted and 199 women attended the meeting.
- 375 women were contacted and dialogued with, through door to door visits.

# STORIES OF SUCCESS

"When I arrived at your doorstep, I felt scared and alone. You took me into your arms and supported me like a family. You gave me hope and stood by me, I highly appreciate your efforts to save my family from breaking.". Raani (name changed)

Raani is a 23-year-old woman who has been married to Rajeev for 5 years and has a 4-year-old son. Raani had been dealing with a lot of problems in her marriage over the last few months, which were affecting her son as well. Raani wanted to resolve the issue with her husband but was concerned about what society would think of her if the matter became public. Raani learned about Mahila Panchayat from a neighbour a few months later. She attended one of the Mahila Panchayat's awareness and training sessions and learned how other women were dealing with issues such as marriage, domestic violence, and so on. After the counselling session, Raani came to the project office of Mahila Panchayat where she expressed her concern about the change in behaviour of her husband for the past few weeks. Her husband had stopped paying household expenses and was also returning home late and avoiding face to face conversations with her. This situation made her mentally disturbed as her husband started living with his parents. It became very difficult for her to run the house because she herself was not financially strong. While talking with Raani our team realised that she wanted reconciliation with her husband and did not want to get a divorce.

Later the team contacted her husband advising him to take initiative to resolve the issue and organised a counselling session for both of them. Her husband realized that fighting and separation was not a solution to any problem and how it will affect their child's growth. Both husband and wife were persuaded to realise the need to clear each other's misunderstandings through face to face conversation. That followed. Mahila Panchayat Coordinator also dialogued with the parents of Raani and her husband. After continuous counselling sessions, her husband agreed to make up things with Raani and decided to live together.

After three months, Raani visited Mahila Panchayat with her husband and said that she was very grateful for the efforts made by the team of Mahila Panchayat to resolve her problem. She further stated that after the Panchayat counselling, both of them began to discuss every issue with a cool mind, and found an amicable solution.

### OTHER EVENTS AND ACTIVITIES

### NATIONAL GIRL CHILD DAY CELEBRATION

As in previous years, National Girl Child Day was celebrated on 24 Jan 21 at Jawaharlal Nehru National Youth Centre Delhi. Due to Covid restrictions, we celebrated it on a small scale. Rasta organised a panel discussion on the following topics: Girl Child Education under New Education Policy. The way forward for Girl Child Development.

Some renowned speakers like Dr Manisha Priyam, Associate Professor, Education Policy, NIEPA, Ms Sharda Kumari, Retd. Principal, D.I.E.T., Mr M.O. Peter, Development Consultant

participated in the discussion. Rasta staff members, students and representatives from various funding partners attended the panel discussion. Ms Sharda Kumari and Dr Manisha Priyam spice their talks with their personal experience and reinforce the point that our society has acquired a lot of awareness about girl child education. Some cultural programmes were also presented by children of Rasta school.







### **COLLABORATION WITH ADOBE INDIA**

Adobe India, which is an important player in the IT field, supported RASTA to spread awareness on Cancer among the RASTA staff, students and community members.

### **AWARENESS PROGRAMME CERVICAL AND BREAST CANCER**

On February 24th, a Cancer Awareness programme was held at Rasta School. Dr Sunita, Rasta's Consultant, presided over the session virtually and aware them of Cervical cancer and inculcate safe lifestyle practices.





### **INSTALLATION OF SOLAR POWER LIGHTS**

Nainwal Pali is located at a distance of 48 km towards the west from headquarters of Almora district, 6 KM from Sult block and 158 KMs from Dehradun, capital of Uttarakhand. It is a medium size village located in BHIKIYASAIN Tehsil of Almora district. About 80 families reside in Nainwal Pali. Like any hilly site, it has an uneven topography that makes it difficult for people to walk especially at night. Furthermore, there are lots of wild animals roaming around, which makes it very risky at night. Attacks by leopards, tigers, bears, bores are very common. They do not have adequate electricity in the village to provide street lights. After various community meetings with the villagers, conducted by RASTA, the need for solar lights has been identified as a priority. With the support of RENEW power, RASTA has installed 12 lights in Nainwal Pali. During the implementation, the need for two more panels was felt and RASTA managed to procure two more lights and installed them at the required spots.

It is learnt that the villagers are now not afraid of walking through the streets at night. Since homes are better lit, children can study late at night.



### **RASTA DURING COVID -19**

The coronavirus pandemic and the subsequent lockdown has affected us in many ways. The crisis is unprecedented and has posed a whole set of challenges for people's well-being across the nation, but it has affected the poor and the marginalized sections of society the most. It has resulted in an economic crisis, resulting in the loss of livelihoods of daily wage workers, migrant laborers, women, children etc.

During this crisis, RASTA was committed to reaching out and supporting them by distributing Dry Rations and Sanitation kits with the support of donors like Zomato Feeding India, Tech Mahindra Foundation, Mobile Creches and ICREON, IBM NASSCOM, SMILE Foundation and NEENV Forces, HCL Foundation.

# **Major Highlights of the Project**

- Conducted awareness sessions with children and parents in the community.
- Staff were trained to make people aware of the pandemic in their respective project locations.
- Rasta conducted a programme where around 4000-12000 people in NOIDA area who have lost their work and daily wages were fed. This activity was carried out under the administrative supervision of the DM of NOIDA.
- Rasta has distributed dry ration kits (Atta, Rice, Dal, tea powder, sugar, biscuits, daliya, soap, oil etc.), to about 1600 families and children in the resettlement colonies of East Delhi, Ghaziabad and Noida.
- Along with this around 850 medical kits (Mask, Soap, Sanitizer and Sanitary Pads)
   were also distributed in the community.



### **AWARDS AND RECOGNITION**

Zlin Film Fest is one of the oldest film festivals for children. SIFCY has been promoting this digital event, which gives an opportunity to the children, to view animated short films for children. This is watched all over the world. They are receiving a positive response from children and parents about the movies. Rasta children also participated in the events and certificates were given to them.
