ABOUT

We are a Non-Government Organization, functioning since 1994 for the empowerment of vulnerable sections of society in Delhi, Uttar Pradesh, Uttarakhand and Haryana, and enjoying national jurisdiction. Our main areas of intervention are Education, Community Health, Women Empowerment and Skill Development. So far, we have educated 28000 children, mainstreamed 8500 children and also developed need-based teaching-learning materials in Hindi, Math's and English for classes 3rd and 4th and imparted vocational skills to over 1200 youth, 40% of whom are in good jobs. Five research studies have been carried out for National and International organizations. We have imparted AIDS awareness to 1,50,000 migrants of high-risk behavior. Presently, Rasta is impacting the lives of 30,000 people directly and 2 lakhs indirectly with the help of 125 professionally trained staff, Well- wishers and our supporting partners.

Rasta" owes its origin to a group of socially conscious individuals, who were disturbed at the sight of children of school going age, rummaging in garbage heaps or standing at traffic intersections with begging bowls. They got together and deliberated upon the plight and potential of such children. The result was "Rasta", a non governmental, not for profit organization, registered in 1994 under the Societies Registration Act XXI of 1860.

ORGANIZATION IMPACT

- 1. 2,883 children have been enrolled in Rasta Educational Centers and School starting from Pre-school to secondary education.
- 2. 3,72,776 pkts of nutritious hot cooked food were served to 2883 children
 - 3. 417 children are mainstreamed in government/private schools in this year
- 4. 3,058 women have been empowered and got awareness on domestic violence through Mahila Panchayat
 - 5. 89,803 migrated workers got awareness on IPC (Infection Prevention & Control) HIV/AIDS
 - 6. 526 health kits were distributed in Fy-22.
- 7. 360 Dry ration pkts were distributed to Rasta school children.
 - 8. 460 children (<15yrs) were vaccinated at vaccination camps organized by Rasta.
 - 9. 2,75,044 pkts cooked nutritious food were distributed to children enrolled in Rasta educational centers in the communities.

PROGRAMME OVERVIEW

In FY 2021-2022 Rasta has mentored and undertaken lot's of educational activities and programs by following COVID-19 protocol with a great responsibility. Children as well as adults were facing a lot of hardship during this period, the main motive of Rasta was to help them in this crisis situation. Most importantly continuing the study of children despite having many challenges and limitation with a sense of responsibility was the main motive of RASTA and we have done our best to achieve the best possible.



IMPACT ON FORMAL EDUCATION

RASTA SCHOOL

Khora Colony (Formal School)



Rasta established a Non-Formal Education Centre in February 2007, with an exclusive aim of promoting education of girl child and to empower them. After many years of struggle and continuous efforts finally we received recognition of formal school in 2016 from UP government. 'Rasta

School' is situated in Khora, Ghaziabad, on the border of Delhi and Uttar Pradesh, catering primarily to socially and economically backward children.

So far, RASTA School has educated 5106 girls & 6 boys. We continue to focus on educating the poor marginalized girls with the support of like-minded partners.

In FY-21 mostly the schools were closed due to lockdown and as per government guidance classes were taken online only, where as in FY 2021 2022 classes were taken with full restriction and by abiding the COVID protocols provided by the government. Both online & amp; offline classes were conducted as per the need & requirement of children. Arrangements were made to accommodate a proper sitting arrangement with social distancing in classrooms. The children who were not attending regular classes were given Classwork and homework via WhatsApp and/or phone calls. 8

SUCCESS STORY

Name of student - Naina Class - 8th Place- Rasta School, Khora Age - 14 years Father's Name -Mr. Chote Lal Mother's name -Mrs. Sanju

Naina was identified as out of school child during a field survey in 2016. Her mother was unable to send her children to school due to financial difficulties and lack of support of her husband. Naina has one brother and one sister. Her father Mr. Chote Lal is a plumber by profession but he spends his entire earning in alcohol and got infected by TB, so he could not work also. This was the main reason why Naiana's mother was unable to support her children in education although she wanted to send them to school. Rasta school teacher's find out her vulnerability and asked her to join Rasta school as a helper and assured her to support her children in education. And enrolled Naina in class 3rd for free. She is continuing her study with a full support from Rasta School Teacher. "If Naina was not enrolled at that time she could be a victim of child marriage, as parents doesn't want to keep their girl child at home for longer period to reach the marriageable age and her life could be miserable as mine", her mother shared with Rasta team. Naina and her siblings are continuing their study and hopefully they will have a bright future. Now Ms. Sanju is our full-time helper and her daughter Naina studies in class 8th and Radhika (Naina's sister) in Class 4th in Rasta School. Naina wants to be a teacher, she said "I would become a teacher & help my family as well girls like me".

Sanju (Naina's mother) says, "I am thankful to Rasta who provided my daughters a chance to study and now they can have a better future".

MAJOR ACTIVITIES CONDUCTED

- Distribution of Dry Ration Kits to Rasta School children & families. Around 360 families received dry Ration kits containing rice, wheat flour, pulses, soap, etc.
- Sanitary Care kits (Sanitary pads, Soap, Mask and Sanitizer) were distributed to senior students and their mother and families to make them aware of self-safety and self-protection in the Pandemic situation
- Three Vaccination Camps were organized for children in Rasta School, where a total of 425 children got vaccinated.

INPACT ON NON-FORMAL EDUCATION PROJECT UDAY

Supported by HCL Foundation







Education is one of the fundamental right of children and each child should lead a life of dignity", Rasta believes in this statement. But mostly children from vulnerable communities or from low-income group are lacking behind to avail this right. Especially migrant children from low-income families do not enjoy equal education opportunities like other children. This is due to three main factors: compulsions to move from one place to another in search of work, non-availability of educational institutions near the worksites and financial inability to study in private educational institutions as these institutions charge high fees. Project Uday is the flagship project of Rasta which serves the practical needs of migrant children through non-formal education and subsequently mainstreaming them. It works as a bridge between the out of school children and school. In project Uday we focus on the holistic development of each individual child. Although giving education is our prime responsibility, along with it we do the following activities for overall development of our children.



- Providing nutritious food: We provide hot cooked nutritious food everyday as per government norms at each Uday center to cater the need of physical development.
- 2. Health & Hygiene: Rasta also inculcates good practices of health & hygiene amongst children to keep them healthy.
- 3. Life Skill: It also draws attention to migrant children's development as human beings (giving them a sense of identity and social responsibility) and helps to nurture their social skills. At the same time, we also inculcate other life skills amongst children to deal with day to day life problems.
- 4. Co-curricular activities: Along with academics, for holistic development of the children we conduct co- curricular activities like Sports, music & dance classes and conduct different competitions on regular basis.
- 5. TLM-We create innovative & need based teaching learning materials and update as and when require to provide age appropriate quality education.

Under project UDAY we have divided our classes into four major groups:
Pre-School from 3-6 years
Non-formal education from 6-14
years
Remedial education for children mainstreamed in formal schools
Other Basic Education (OBE) is for those children, who, due to overage or otherwise, cannot study in formal schools

SUCCESS STORY

Centre: Barola 2
Name of the student:

Manish, a 9 year old boy stays in Noida with her single mother who works as a domestic help in nearby societies. She left her husband 5 years ago and came to Noida and is currently staying with her parental home. Manish was a small child when his mother got divorced. He was not admitted to any school because her mother could not afford to send him to any school. During Community survey, our mobilizer came in contact with Manish who was playing in the streets and on asking about the school he said that he doesn't go to any school. By listening this, the mobilizer asked Manish to call his mother but her mother was on work, he called her maternal grandmother and the mobilizer told about Rasta learning center to her. But she didn't understand anything and after a couple of days for follow up, the mobiliser again went to his home and luckily found his mother. The mobilizer informed her about Rasta learning center and she got agreed to admit Manish in the learning center. Manish joined the center and started coming every day his teacher observed that he is afraid of responding and never socialized with his classmates. She went to home visit and spoke with his mother and came to know about the difficulties faced by them because of his father who is the sole reason for her separation. He was abusing her physically and mentally that's why the child got traumatized. The teacher made sure that Manish do not feel scared in the class and indulged him in extracurricular activities and classes. She also motivated him for socializing in the class and make friends.

After a long intervention and counseling now, Manish starts socializing with friends and he was responding in the class.

This way education and Rasta helps children who are living under difficult circumstances.

MAJOR HIGHLIGHTS

- 2346 children were motivated and enrolled in Rasta Gurkul Centres
- 343 were mainstreamed in age-appropriate classes up to elementary level
- 103 children were enrolled under Open Basic Education in NIOS
- Children became healthy and active because of the nutritious, hot, cooked food served in Gurukul
- Conducted remedial education classes for 417 mainstreamed children and supported those children who could not be mainstreamed, to appear for Open Basic Examinations
- 85,765 packets of cooked nutritious food Pkts were served to children who were enrolled in Gurukul Centers
- 1100 children participated in sports day program
- 627 children attended Summer Camp and prepared items using waste materials

IMPACT ON NON-FORMAL EDUCATION

PROJECT NAYA SAVERA

Indira Camp, New Delhi



Project Naya Savera is a joint venture of Rasta & IC
Trust. It is based at Indira Camp (a JJ Cluster) in
Hasanpur near Madhu Vihar, East Delhi. The key
objective of this project is to empower community
through education and the project is progressing
towards achieving its goal. During FY 2021-2022 we
have educated 116 children out of which 26 children are
mainstreamed in nearby Govt. schools. Alongside
regular schooling, these children are given remedial
classes. It has a rewarding impact in the community.

MAJOR HIGHLIGHTS

- 116 children were enrolled in Pre-school, NFE & Dreschool, NFE & Drescho
- 26 children were mainstreamed in government schools.
- 354 parents attended in PTMs conducted every month.
- 22 girls were given self-defense training





INPACT ON NON-FORMAL EDUCATION GYASPUR LEARNING CENTRE

Sarai Kale Khan



The Gyaspur Learning Centre was established in November 2020 with the support of the Welspun Foundation, with the goal of aiding the education, health, and hygiene of children from migrant communities. Our educational program at Gyaspur seeks to provide basic education to these children. A baseline survey conducted within the community revealed that a significant number of children between the ages of 10-14 were either not attending school or had dropped out. Moreover, they lacked fundamental language and arithmetic skills, and there was a lack of awareness regarding basic health and hygiene practices. Our project aims to address these challenges by achieving the following objectives:

- 1. We aim to provide education to children between the ages of 3 to 6 years old through a preschool program. Additionally, we strive to ensure the enrollment of children between the ages of 6-14 in both non-formal education centers and mainstream schools.
- 2. Our program seeks to provide life skills training and counseling to adolescents, particularly in regards to gender-based discrimination, self-defense, and other essential skills.
 - 3. Our efforts aim to improve health, hygiene, and sanitation, particularly among women and young girls.





SUCCESS STORY

Name :Kashish Age: 13 years

"Now I feel powerful and can fight my own battle without feeling scared".

Kashish is a 13-year-old girl from Gyaspur. She lives with her parents and siblings and attends Nangli Rajapur Sarai Kale Khan Government School, where she is in 7th grade. She also attends our Remedial classes. Kasish discusses how learning self-defense techniques helped her defend herself when she needed to. She explained, "When I was studying in my class, suddenly a boy came and touched me from behind without my consent, suddenly I remembered the technique I learned from the self-defense training in and I punched the boy on his face, seeing to which my teacher was shocked and asked me where I learned all such things. At first I was scared to tell them about my training thinking what they would think, but after repeatedly asking I told them about the NGO Rasta and Welspun foundation who has been providing free education to children and told them about the free self-defense training provided by them . My sir was so impressed with me and he said, "Well done, like you other girls should learn such techniques"". Finally, she stated that "the training not only gave me strength from the outside, but also from the inside to take a stand in places where it is necessary". There other girls also in the community like Kashish who got so much confidence and courage to face any kind of situation.

MAJOR HIGHLIGHTS

- A total of 115 children were enrolled in Gyaspur Learning Center in which 47 children in the age group of 3-6 years enrolled in preschool and 68childre children in the age group of 7-14 years enrolled in Remedial and Non- Formal Education (NFE). Total 8 children were mainstreamed in government school.
- 6 OPDs were conducted in Gyaspur area where a total of 366 people got free health check ups and medicines.
- Conducted HB test of 108 adolescent girls/ women in Gyaspur to find out HB level in them and to aware them about anemia.
- Total 34 girls learned self-defense techniques to protect themselves in unforeseen circumstances.
- 34 girls and 38 boys were oriented on life skills such as Nutrition & Anemia, MHM, Adolescent growth & development, Healthy mind &, Healthy behavior, Gender and violence.
- 85 beneficiaries were oriented on POCSO Act.
- 4 sanitation drives were conducted at regular intervals in Gyaspur area to keep the surrounding clean .

IMPACT ON NON-FORMAL EDUCATION

TARGETED INTERVENTION PROJECT



Targeted Intervention Project with the support of the National AIDS Control Organization (NACO) and Delhi State Aid Control Society (DSACS) is implementing HIV/AIDS awareness programme amongst migrant workers. The aim of the project is to educate people in respect of HIV/AIDS by conducting health camps, awareness camps, street plays in different places under the targeted intervention areas

MAJOR HIGHLIGHTS

- A total of 89803 migrants were aware about HIV/AIDS prevention measures.
- 20325 migrants were registered.
- 284 health camps were organized and 7913 migrants avail the services of health care consultation.
- 47 STI cases were identified in health camps/Clinic
- HIV/AIDS counseling was given to 7913 no of migrant workers.
- 5328 migrants have done HIV test in ICTC+CBS out of which 18 were identified as HIV positive including one spouse.





WOMEN EMPOWERMENT PROGRAM



Women empowerment is one of the important goal of Rasta. To achieve this goal, Rasta runs the Mahila Panchayat programme in Mandawali area in Delhi which is supported by Delhi Commission for Women (DCW). The main objective of this project is women empowerment. Some of the main objectives of this programme are:


- (a) Create mass awareness amongst women
- (b) make women legally empowered by making them aware of their legal rights and address their issues.

It also provides a forum for conflict resolution relating to family disputes at the community level. Along with this, it prepares women for legal action and seek legal aid when necessary. These cases mainly pertain to bigamy, maintenance, domestic violence, alcoholism and other issues. Apart from this, service-related cases for securing Aadhar Card, Voter Identity Card, Birth Certificates, Old age pension, Ladli Yogna etc. are also been addressed.

MAJOR HIGHLIGHTS

- 21 community meetings were conducted, through these 554 women were aware about their rights especially on prevention of domestic violence & eve teasing.
- 22 Mahila Panchayat Meetings were conducted and 538 members attended the meetings, they discussed about various issues that women are facing in the community and how to support them during this crisis.
- 1121 women interacted and came to know about the services provided by Mahila Panchayat, through door to door visit.
- 622 cases were registered out of which 533 cases were solved or closed and 36 were referred to DLSA/DCW/181/CAW.
- 223 women avail general services/information.
